Alvarez and Marsal in Natrona

On Monday June 4th and Tuesday June 5th 2018, Habitat for Humanity of Allegheny Valley, along with Natrona Comes Together, were lucky enough to receive nearly 200 volunteers from the New York City global professional services firm Alvarez & Marsal in a joint effort to enhance the town of Natrona.

The 200 plus volunteer blitz build lasted two days and took place in Natrona Community Park. The goal of this rehabilitation project was to bring people together and make lasting changes in the community. With the help of Alvarez and Marsal we set out to help bring art and beauty back into the community, provide a safe environment for children, and make known the rich history of the town. In recent years the community has worked hard to make Natrona a safe and welcoming environment for children, and keep the arts thriving. Habitat for Humanity was happy to work alongside Natrona Comes Together to further enhance the town into a more beautiful, artistic, and welcoming place for all. The community restoration project included a number of different efforts intended to revitalize the community such as:

- Construction of amphitheater wall and benches
- Install outdoor children's classroom / workshop
- River walk clean up
- Home rehabilitation
- Community museum
- Community garden





Habitat is truly blessed to receive the strong support of volunteers and donors throughout the Natrona project. From every corner of the community people showed their willingness to help and make a difference. The volunteers from Alvarez and Marsal displayed a passion to be there and took pride in every minute of their servitude.

The two day build engagement concluded with a Pittsburgh Pirates baseball game where the firm presented a \$25,000 check to Habitat for Humanity on the field. The contribution was made to help continue efforts intended to transform the landscapes of the region. Projects are expected to be completed in the fall of 2018 utilizing help from a number of local volunteers.

Pivik's Play for All!



On Friday September 28th, Pivik Elementary school located in Plum Borough is set to receive a new playground in collaboration with Habitat for Humanity Allegheny Valley, Duquesne Light, and KaBOOM. Along with funding the venture, over 100 employees from Duquesne Light Company will be volunteering

during the single day blitz build commencing in September. KaBOOM, a nonprofit based out of Washington DC dedicated to safe play for all children, will provide the equipment and construction facilitators for the day.

Habitat for Humanity director John Tamiggi along with Pivik Elementary school principal Kristen Gestrich applied for the "Build it with KaBOOM" grant in hopes of receiving the funding needed to develop a more inclusive playground for the school. The current playground is only a few years old, but with redistricting and growing enrollment Pivik is in need of a playground more suited to its students' needs.

This particular playground will be uniquely designed as an inclusive playground striving to meet the needs of special education students, as well as those with any physical or sensory challenges. In addition, Habitat is hoping to encompass the idea of the Universal Language of Play throughout the process. The playground will accommodate the growing needs of the school as their enrollment increases from 600 to a projected 750 students.

Pivik elementary hosts the ESL international program for the district and welcomes several students from various parts of the world. With play being an integral part of childhood development, it is important that all children have a comfortable place to play. While some children might not be able to communicate through the same spoken language, everyone can communicate through play.

What makes this project even more exciting is the way in which the playground will be constructed. On July 19th a design day involving parents, children, teachers, and other community members took place to determine what will best suit the needs of the school. Children were asked to build their own "dream" playground using LEGO's and other blocks under the supervision of professionals. This LEGO



build was extremely successful, and the children had tons of fun. Results will help the committee gather information about what children enjoy in a playground and what they might struggle with so that developers have a better understanding of what children truly want and enjoy in their playground.

Parents were also involved in the design day to form committees and provide input. From these meetings, Habitat and Pivik will then work with KaBOOM to choose the playground equipment necessary.

Jennifer Evans, a teacher at Pivik elementary and mother of two, is very excited about the playground. Jenn has been teaching kindergarten at Pivik for 15 years and notes that "due to redistricting, we are expanding our student population. This expansion includes all of the ESL kids in the district."

She feels that the playground will be received well not only accommodate the growing population but also to capture the developmental needs of students. She stated "The number of students with special needs is on the rise everywhere and the numbers increase yearly. Having a bigger play space that meets various needs will help all children in our school play together."



As a mother of two sons who both have autism and apraxia, Jennifer is confident they would benefit from equipment that allows them to be included with their peers. Jennifer helped with the planning of design day and also supervised children as they worked. She plans to continue her heavy involvement with the project in all stages of development. After all, she notes, "Play is the foundation for all of the other learning the children encounter in a school day."

Habitat for Humanity of Allegheny Valley is excited to partner with Duquesne Light, KaBOOM, and Pivik Elementary on this endeavor. We expect it to be a great community partnership and something that will strengthen the entire district. We are happy to help provide a safe,



welcoming, and fun playground for ALL children. Stay tuned for our next newsletter to see how the build day unfolds and view pictures of the new playground!
